Who we are



Courage is an open-source child protection and empowerment programme that combines toolkits and workshop processes to help child protection officers, community members, families, parents and learners to recognise the rights and needs of all children, to identify where they are being abused or overlooked, and to develop the strategies needed to solve these problems.

Courage empowers child protection officers, who include, teachers, social workers, doctors, nurses, police officers, NGO workers, carers and more, to make a difference in the lives of the children, families and communities they care for. It teaches them how to build meaningful win/win partnerships with each other and gives them the tools they need to understand and strategically engage with the challenges they encounter every day.

Courage is constantly developing new content and training programmes to ensure that we are empowering our community coaches to address real issues on the ground. These programmes span child protection, which includes child abuse, neglect and exploitation; child rights; sexuality and gender awareness; option counselling for crisis pregnancy; positive parenting; child abandonment and adoption. In the space of personal and community empowerment, Courage has developed a personal empowerment toolkit and a Be Kind, anti-bullying toolkit for parents, teachers and learners to engage with.

The help we need

Courage trains community coaches who are then empowered to facilitate workshops in their communities to address the many child protection challenges we see happening around the world.



Child protection in SA?



The legal definition of child protection (Children's Act 38 of 2005) is the prevention and responding to violence, exploitation and abuse against children. There are three main themes to child protection; neglect, where a child is either not cared for or has been abandoned by their caregivers; abuse, where a child is subjected to a range of different forms of abuse such as physical, emotional and sexual abuse or harmful cultural practices; and finally exploitation, where a child is used or exploited for monetary or other forms of gain. These challenges are a lived reality for many children in South Africa (as noted in the statistics below) and around the world.


An empowered approach



The world of child protection is made up of three kinds of people: 1) the child protection officers, 2) children, and 3) perpetrators, or people who have done something wrong to a child. Too often these three kinds of people find themselves in a 'cycle of disempowerment', where the child protection officer becomes a rescuer, the child becomes a victim and the perpetrator, a persecutor.

Unfortunately, each of these people tend to move around this cycle of disempowerment with no real change in behaviour. The rescuer becomes the victim, the victim becomes the persecutor, and the persecutor becomes the rescuer, and so the cycle continues.

We need to break out of this cycle of disempowerment into one of empowerment. In an empowered approach to child protection, the child protection officer becomes a enabler, helping the child and the perpetrator to make different choices. The child becomes a survivor or thriver, and the perpetrator becomes an accountable person, who knows the difference between right and wrong.



Courage uses an empowered theory of change that focusses on three key drivers:

- 1) Building participant's belief in possibility, by helping them to create a vision for their children's future, building on this through knowledge and insight, and creating tangible and measurable action plans.
- 2) Increasing participant's self awareness, by helping them to define their own personal values, creating win/win partnerships and building their self esteem.
- 3) Creating an environment of love and abundance, with community harmony, compassion, empathy and connection.



Picture based tools





The basic Courage Toolkit is made up of 4 picture based A1 durable PVC posters:

- 1) The Courage Community Map:- which illustrates a typical community anywhere in the world, complete with people, spaces and the child protection challenges they are experiencing, using an accessible emoji child protection language.
- 2) The Courage Rights & Needs Map:- which illustrates children's rights and needs based on developmental stages, essentially how a child should grow up.
- 3) The Courage Empowered Child Protection Map:- which illustrates the shift from disempowered to empowered drivers of change for different child protection challenges.
- 4) The Courage Child Protection & Safeguarding Process Map:- which illustrates the step by step approach to child protection and safeguarding.
- 5) The Courage Disempowerment Card Pack:- which illustrates every single child protection challenge that exists in the world today and the seven disempowerment drivers that cause them, to build awareness and understanding.
- 6) The Courage Empowerment Card Pack:- which illustrates the seven empowerment drivers of change, child developmental stages, children's rights and importantly the responsibilities that come with those rights, to guide behaviour change.
- 7) The Courage Quick Start Guide:- which illustrates our philosophy and empowered approach to change and the different exercises to be undertaken in a workshop.















As Courage is an open-source programme, all materials can be downloaded from our website for free. Any costs related to a toolkit are associated with hard costs for printing and workshop materials.

A workshop can be run with the printed toolkit, or a facilitator can use the various Courage presentations, videos, templates and workbooks which can be downloaded from our website for free.

COURAGE TRAIN-THE-TRAINER WORKSHOPS

As previously noted, Courage positions itself as an 'ingredient brand' that works inside the child protection and empowerment community, assisting them in the work they do. This means that we would like to empower as many child protection officers and organisations as we can with Courage toolkits and training processes.

If you have an NGO, a school or ECD centre; a child protection or health care organisation; a children's home; a sporting or creative after school programme; or a community that you support, please consider sponsoring a Train-the-Trainer workshop for the people who work in each of these important organisations.

The Courage Train-the-Trainer workshop consists of a full day in-person workshop, follow-up online training, and mentorship, which will empower participants to run Courage workshops in the communities they serve.

Investment:

- A full day workshops for 10 to 30 participants with a senior Courage Community Coach costs R8 000-00 (venue, catering and travel not included).
- We would recommend that each participant is empowered with at least 2 toolkits, which can be used to train 12 to 14 participants at a time. A full Courage toolkit costs R600-00 and a mini toolkit (cards & quick start guide) costs R200-00.

COURAGE COMMUNITY COACH WORKSHOPS

Once a Courage Community Coach has engaged in a train-the-trainer workshop, online training consolidation, and mentorship, they will be ready to facilitate their own Courage Community Workshops. Some of our coaches are able to conduct community engagement as part of their employment, but many have to run workshops in their own time and we would like to support them in their efforts.

Investment:

- Most Courage workshops take between 2 and 6 hours to run, we would like to offer our coaches R150 per hour of facilitation in their communities.
- Coaches will need to get their respondents to complete an attendance register, and to capture the output from their workshop on the Courage insight database to apply for funding. This has the added benefit of measuring and evaluating child protection challenges in all the

Funding new programmes



Courage has developed a number of community programmes over the years to ensure that our training and engagement materials remain relevant to our child protection officers and the communities they serve.

Programme content, instructional and graphic design is developed by Dr Blackie in partnership with Trainiac, a leading learning design consultancy based in South Africa. Each programme is informed by extensive insight gathering from child protection specialists and community/educational research which is conducted on a continual basis.

Since Courage's launch in 2015, we have developed the following programmes for the global child protection community:

NEW PROGRAMME DEVELOPMENT

The Courage team is in the process of developing three new programmes for our child protection community. The instructional and graphic design development of a new programme costs between R200 000-00 and R500 000-00 depending on the size of the programme, and the number of new posters, and workshop materials needed.

The Courage School Safety Programme builds off our cornerstone child protection programme but focusses on child safety in the school environment. It will explore issues such as grooming, corporal punishment and bullying, and how to escalate concerns around abuse or exploitation. It will also explore learner rights and empowerment.

The Courage Community Anti-Addiction Programme is aimed at addressing the high levels of drug and alcohol abuse we are seeing in communities around the world. The focus is on how communities can support individuals and families in their

battle with addiction and into recovery.

The Courage Mental Health Programme is entirely NEW, but uses our innovative theory of change approach to empower community based solutions for mental health challenges. Participants are empowered to identify, understand and develop practical community based support systems for individuals experiencing mental health challenges and fostering personal empowerment.

Courage is partnering with A Better Africa in the development of an online knowledge community in the education sector focussed on child protection and empowerment.

The platform will include active directories for personal and organisational profiles, organisational empowerment to create opportunities and connections, knowledge sharing and management, community engagement, managing processes and projects to share best practice and a smart mobile solution.

An educational knowledge community will drive good practice in child protection and empowerment, from within the community. It will build cohorts of connected change makers, share critical information that is relevant and grounded in the community context, and drive empowered behaviour change.

Janice Scheckter is CEO or A Better Africa and has spent the past several years building the online ecosystem for African education. Through Janice's guidance A Better Africa has attracted over 20 000 stakeholders in Africa education. From downloading much needed resources to the new Staff Room, which is building connections between stakeholders to share ideas, challenges and successes.

Online community design and management, which includes configuration of the community profile/s, designing the user journey, creating the wiki structure, content curation, social media promotion and subscriptions costs R96 000-00 per year. Any support would be very welcome.


